Over a dozen Public Health Fellows have moved on from their roles at Cornell Health to pursue professional careers in public health, medicine, social work, and other related fields.



Laura Santacrose, '11 Public Health Fellow (2011–12)

Laura majored in Human Development within the College of Human Ecology. She was a Resident Advisor on North Campus for three years and spent four years walking backwards as a Campus Tour Guide. Laura's passion for public health deepened when she worked in the Cornell Infant Studies Lab. After completing her term as Cornell Health's first Public Health Fellow, she attended the University at Albany School of Public Health, where she obtained an MPH with a concentration in Social Behavior and Community Health. In grad school, Laura conducted research at the Alden March Bioethics Institute and worked as a Community Health Educator at the Suffolk County Health Department. After graduate school, she returned to Cornell to work as a Health Initiatives Coordinator within the Skorton Center for Health Initiatives. She now serves as its Assistant Director. Laura recently developed, implemented, and evaluated a new bystander intervention program called *Intervene* for use at Cornell and by other universities.



Joe Bergen, '12 Kahn-Millman Public Health Fellow

Joe graduated from the College of Arts and Sciences with a major in Biological Sciences. While at Cornell, he was a Resident Advisor for first-year students and president of the service fraternity Alpha Phi Omega. 


Angela Falisi, '12 Public Health Fellow (2012–13)

Her interest in public health was sparked by her work in the Social Media Lab of the Department of Communication, which focused on the relationship between mobile technology and social support. After completing her term as a Public Health Fellow, Angela attended the University at Albany School of Public Health, where she obtained an MPH with a concentration in Social Behavior and Community Health in 2015.
